

VEC Football Club

1974 - 2026



The process that started the formation of the **V.E.C. Football Club** was a letter from a number of administrative staff working in the City of Dublin **Vocational Education Committee (V.E.C.)** to its Chief Executive Officer in **Summer 1974** formally seeking the use of the VEC Sportsgrounds in Terenure — which he granted. The Club then made application to the United Churches Football League of Ireland. Our first Chairman Vin Lennon attended that meeting, along with the first Hon. Secretary Liam Cooke (R.I.P.) and our Chairman for 42 of those years, David Spring. We were immediately accepted into the top division. We have remained in the top (Premier) division ever since – bar 2 seasons. In the 1982-1983 season, our first team moved to the Leinster Senior League Major Division and our application to keep our other team in the top division of the UCFL, was rejected and we were assigned by the League to the old second division, and duly won the Club's first league title after a play-off game against Harcourt Rovers, and of course we were immediately promoted back to the top division. Then 42 years later, in the 2024-2025 season, we applied/opted to play in Division 1 after most of the first team players retired or moved from Dublin and we were down to 1 team ... and we finished 2nd and were immediately promoted back to the premier division ... again!

Sport is so special when you fight for the same cause. The aim from day one was to align everyone in the Club with the same values, through self-discipline, teamwork, co-operation and in a spirit of sportsmanship. A big part of our Club's philosophy was defining those values and that essentially defined our Club and sport and life has shown that once you have a shared club-wide philosophy, you reap the rewards – and we did – not just on the field, but off it as well – for all of those 52 years!

VEC's legacy is a permanent one, which cannot be erased.

But, after **52 years** of continuous and proud membership of the United Churches Football League and playing in the VEC Sportsgrounds in Terenure, it is with genuine sadness and no small amount of reluctance that we formally notified the League at the end of July 2026 of **VEC Football Club's withdrawal from the League, effective immediately.**

It is an incredibly painful and sobering reality when a 52-year-old football club is forced to fold. The bittersweet reality of the proverb that *"all good things eventually come to an end"* makes our experiences and memories over 52-years treasured. Change is a fundamental law of our world. Over 5 decades of pride and Saturdays spent playing for **VEC FC** or being on the touchline will now disappear for many due to changing times. Whether it's down to shifts in work arrangements, family commitments, alternate recreation options, or local demographics, it has become a constant battle maintaining a consistent squad for what is an amateur football club with no obvious feeder system. So, with a combination of some now based on the northside, players departing Dublin, and some unexpected retirements, left us well short of the minimum registrations needed to safely and reliably fulfil our fixture obligations, despite our recent best efforts to plug the gaps.

We have survived this long purely on the backs of dedicated individuals and because of numerous successes over the years, which obviously attracted some very gifted players. When those key people (managers and players) eventually stepped away or retired, a lack of new volunteers or talented players to pick up the mantle eventually paralysed the Club! Of course, with the League assigning us to the premier division last season, when we had clearly signalled that Div. 1 would be the appropriate level for our squad, ultimately led to our decline, as we were clearly out of our depth in the premier division! The jump in standard, intensity and depth between the divisions just exposed our squad thinness! Now ... let's look back ...

The Not-to-be-Forgotten Memories

[and there are many, many more]

- **7th September 1974:** VEC Football Club played its first official game. It was a UCFL Premier (Barton) Shield match played in the VEC Sportsgrounds in Terenure against St. Maelruan's from Tallaght, and unfortunately, we lost 1-3. The line-out (4-3-3) comprised of 10 CDVEC administrative staff + 2 friends:

- **52 consecutive years** in the United Churches Football League (UCFL).

- **Never relegated** from the top (Premier) division in the League – even in the last season. That's a remarkable and unique achievement in itself of which everyone who was ever associated with **VEC FC** should be very proud!
- A **2nd team formed in 1976** and continued for 48 consecutive years.
- A **3rd team was formed in 1983** and had a total of 26 seasons up to 2018.
- **Winning the Premier Division on 4 occasions: 2009, 2016, 2017, 2019.**

2008-2009: At last! In our 35th season, with **Dave Spring** and **Noel Ryan** at the helm, we won our first Premier Division title. Having beaten UCFL 'kingpins' Trinity Corinthians in the league for the first time in Santry early in the season, it came down to the final premier league game of the season, when VEC had to beat Trinity in Terenure to win the title.

got the important goals, ensuring that we pipped Trinity by 1 point. **Ross Kavanagh** captained the team.

More about the 2016 league title later!

- Reaching the **Challenge Cup Final** on 12 occasions and **winning 9** of them: 1980, 1981, 1984, 1988, 1993, 2011, 2016, 2019, 2022.

In that first Cup win, **VEC** registered Spartak Dynamo's 's only defeat in the entire 1980-81 season, with former League of Ireland player and VEC midfielder **Pat Quin**, scoring all four **VEC** goals in a 4-0 win.

In that last Cup Final win in 2022, we met Tallaght Utd. winning 1-0. **Séamus Staunton** got the goal in Home Farm scoring in his third successive Challenge Cup Final.



- **Winning the Richard Knight Cup** on 2 occasions: 2016 & 2022. In 2022, we completed the cup double, beating Tallaght Utd. 1-0 once again, with **Tom Wrynn** getting the goal in Frank Cooke Park. [Trophies right].

- **Winning the Premier Division Shield** on 6 occasions: 1979 (the 1st trophy we won), 1988, 2005, 2011, 2016, 2020.

- **VEC 2nds winning Division 2** in 1983. ➡
- **VEC 2nds winning the Division 2 Shield** in 2005.



- **VEC 3rds winning the Bedlow Cup** in 2014.
- **3 x VEC teams winning the UCFL's Merit Award:** 3rds in 2004-2005, 1sts in 2012-2013, 2nds in 2013-2014.
- **FAI Junior Cup achievements:** In 1986, a wonderful run in the F.A.I. Junior Cup saw the club reach the **6th round**, only to be knocked out by top A.U.L. side Glenmore Celtic.

In 1988-1989 after winning our 5th round F.A.I. Junior Cup game against Beggsboro (who were runners-up in the previous year's final), we met the previous year's F.A.I. Junior Cup winners, Tolka Rovers in the **last 16** of that cup in Terenure. We lost 2-0 with the second goal only coming in injury time when **VEC** were pressing forward. Tolka Rovers went on to win the trophy.

For only the third time, we reached the **6th round** of the FAI Junior Cup in 2004-2005, before losing 0-1 to top Tipperary outfit Peakevilla.

Reaching the **5th Round** of the **FAI Junior Cup** in our Quadruple season where we met one of the favourites (and subsequently losing finalists) Pike Rovers in Limerick in December 2015 was an achievement, but although we gave a good account of ourselves, we eventually succumbed to a 2-0 loss.

The following season, we reached the **last-16** of this Cup. Unfortunately, we lost 2-0 to Boyle Celtic away on 5th February 2017, to end a magnificent run in this prestigious cup.

Once again, we reached the **7th round (last 16)** of the **FAI Junior Cup** for the second time in three years, unfortunately losing 1-3 to Kilkenny outfit Evergreen FC on 3rd February 2019.



- **Leinster Junior Cup:** That memorable **6th round** game on a Sunday in 2006 losing only 1-0 to arguably the best Junior soccer club in the country at the time Killester Utd. who went on to win the Trophy.
- Former **VEC** player **Jim Behan** hammering home four goals against Galway United on his debut for Thurles Town in the League of Ireland in March 1982.
- **12 children's Christmas Parties** were held in Kevin Street College from 1985 with an average of thirty children of **VEC** players attending annually – together with their parents.
- **Willie Kissane Perpetual Trophy:** The inaugural match took place against C.Y.M. in their Sportsclub in Terenure. The magnificent trophy (Willie's Boot) was specially commissioned by the club following Willie's untimely death in 1997 at the age of 36 after a short illness. The tournament was organised by the Club in each of the 20 years from 1998-2017 in Willie's memory. Suaimhneas sioraí dá anam. For the last 14 years of its 20 years' operating, the Willie Kissane Tournament was an 8-team invitational 11-a-side tournament. In those 20 years, **VEC** won 'Willie's Boot' on 6 occasions.



- **The 2nds and the 3rds** drawn to play each other in the quarter final of the Leslie Reynolds Cup on 1st April 1995. Played in the VEC grounds in Whitehall (the 3rds home pitch for many years), the 2nds won 1-0.
- Then in December 1998, **VEC 1sts & VEC 2nds** were drawn to play each other in the Challenge Cup. The 1sts beat the 2nds by 3 goals to 2 after another memorable match played in a truly sporting spirit and where again, from a club point of view, the correct result was achieved!
- **Summer Tours/Tournaments** to Thurles in 1976 and 1977, followed by trips to Ennis, Waterford, Cork and eventually to the National 5-a-side tournament in Salthill in Galway for many years, on the June bank-holiday week-end.
- **The VEC Golf Outings:** The VEC inaugural golf outing was held in 1997. Then, from 2001 to 2012, there followed very successful and enjoyable golf trips to Westport, Dungarvan, Athlone, Kilkenny, Waterford, Ballyliffin, Dromoland and Killarney — some on more than one occasion.
- Our very successful **25th Anniversary** Dinner Dance was held in City West Country House and Hotel to commemorate our Silver Jubilee in April 1999. A superb commemorative brochure with over 70 pages of memorabilia, press cuttings and photos spanning the 25 years made for compulsive reading for all in attendance.
- Former players **Karl Nolan, Tommy Doherty** and **Paul Hutchinson** followed in **Joe O'Hanlon's** footsteps and changed their football boots for a pair of Referee's boots – and continue to make a good job of it too! Of course, not forgetting **Séamus Doherty** who refereed for a few years and **Eddie Reilly** who went refereeing, having played in 1993-1994 – when, for the only time we played in a Sunday league (LSL).
- Speaking of **Séamus**, from 2001, he combined his trojan work as Club Secretary and then Treasurer for **VEC** with his sterling work on the Executive Committee of the United Churches Football League (UCFL) before being elected to the very demanding role of Hon. Treasurer of the UCFL and a position he still holds.
- **Honorary Life Members:** Having rendered exceptional service to the Club in its first 25 years and as he was stepping down as Chairman, **David Spring** was honoured in 1999 with Honorary Life Membership. The Club referred to his unstinting, immeasurable and professional work in the massive administration necessary for the successful running of our club. In 2007, **Fergal (Stumpy) Nolan** was honoured with Honorary Life Membership of the Club, acknowledging his 10 years as team manager of the 1sts and 2nds.



In 2005, as they were stepping down as Chairman and Hon. Secretary respectively, **Noel Ryan** and **Séamus Doherty** were both elected into Honorary Life Membership for their immense, important and hugely valuable work for the club over many years. Not forgetting **Noel's** exploits as a player for 23 seasons, scoring 198 goals.



- **Pick-a-Winner:** Our on-line Fundraiser Pick-A-Winner commenced in 2001, and 10 years later was transmogrified to the current on-line version by **Neil Spring** (www.pickawinner.ie).



- **Also in 2001** (October) for a third time, two **VEC** teams were drawn together in the 2nd round of the Irish Life Challenge Cup ... and again the 1sts beat the 2nds, this time by 6 goals to 2 after another memorable match played in a truly sporting spirit!
- **2002:** Our excellent and enviable website www.vecfc.ie was also developed by **Neil** and the VEC logo/crest was created.

- **2012:** The legendary **Andy Myler** came out of retirement and signed with **VEC FC**. He retired from Bray Wanderers at the end of the 2008 season having scored a total of 133 League of Ireland career goals. He began his professional career at UCD. He also played for Newry Town, Monaghan United, Athlone Town, Waterford United, Drogheda United and Longford Town, before he was signed by Shamrock Rovers in July 2006, where he scored 20 goals in his two seasons there. He made his **VEC** debut on 14th January 2012 in the UCFL's Premier Division game against Strand Utd. in VEC Terenure. He went on to play 89 official games for **VEC** in the following 9 seasons, scoring 32 goals along the way.



- **2013:** At the grand 'young' age of 54, 1st team player/manager **Hutch** scored the last of his 56 goals in a cup match against Castle Celtic.
- Our very successful **40th Anniversary** B-B-Q was held in the Morrison Hotel on Ormond Quay on 11th October 2014 and there were nearly 80 in attendance. Our guests included a good friend to the Club over many years and a former President of the Football Association of Ireland – David Blood. The Chief Executive of the Football Association of Ireland John Delaney graciously accepted our invitation and attended together with some friends, including a certain Jane Seymour, who achieved international fame in her role as Bond girl Solitaire in the James Bond film *Live and Let Die* (seen here with UCFL Chairman Barney Blood).



➤ **The Quadruple:**



- The 2015-2016 season surpassed everything **VEC** ever achieved in any one season! Having won the Premier Division Shield on the May Bank-holiday Monday by beating AGP FC 4-3 on penalties, we then added the UCFL Challenge Cup by beating South William Street Celtic 4-1 on Saturday 21st May in Home Farm and then the Richard Knight Cup by beating FC Sportslink Ailesbury 5-1 on 31st May. On top of all that, we clinched the Premier Division title for only the second time in our first 42 years. **Dave Spring** and **Kevin O'Hanlon** were at the helm for this remarkable and historic season where VEC were quadruple winners!
- What an honour it was for the Club when we were asked to represent the Leinster Football Association in an annual fixture for the **John Bagster Cup** against a Mid-Ulster team. We played Hill Street FC. on 22nd April 2017 in Kilkeel, Co. Down, but lost 3-2.
- **July 2017:** What a day in VEC on 29th July 2017 as the inaugural '**Champions v Legends**' Match took place. Many past players joined the Champions. Then a year later, the 2nd annual VEC 'Champions v Legends' Match took place in July 2018. The turnout was fantastic again and really built on the success of the previous year. The 3rd annual VEC 'Champions v Legends' match took place in August 2019. The turnout was great once again. But that was the last one as Covid-19 disrupted football in 2020.
- The **COVID-19** pandemic: The FAI announced on March 12th 2020, the cessation of all football under its jurisdiction with immediate effect, following directives from Government, the Department of Health and UEFA. It meant that no fixtures were set until

further notice. Football resumed some 4 months later. For months throughout the 2020-2021 season (if you could call it that), we had Level 5 Government restrictions which prevented us playing. As such, the 2020/2021 season was effectively a washout. We resumed training on 11th May 2021. Then the League's admirable proposals for a 'Return to Football' resulted in a Pre-season Tournament which ran from 12th June 2021 to 7th August 2021.

- Of extraordinary interest was VEC player **Jack McKnight** playing full world cup qualifying matches at left back for the Turks and Caicos Islands national football team against Nicaragua and Belize in March 2021.
- In June 2022, as part of the FAI's centenary celebrations, Club Chairman **David Spring** received one of the 300 **FAI Centenary medals** produced for his outstanding service and commitment to grassroots soccer in Ireland. An honour for him and the Club.
- Our very successful **50th Anniversary**: We marked our **Golden Jubilee**, 50th year as a club, in May 2024 with a fantastic evening in the Freemason's Hall on Molesworth Street. The celebration saw over 80 players and club members from every decade, together with some guests, gathered to share war stories while enjoying a pint and something to eat. Everyone in attendance on the night also received a commemorative lapel pin of the club's re-designed crest and a wonderful commemorative brochure recalling many memories, records, 'moments of truth', achievements & successes from 1974 to 2024.
- Two outstanding players whose incredible goalscoring exploits helped bring some great successes to **VEC**. **Joey Byrne** scored a **record** 263 goals in 498 games over the last 22 seasons, while **Aidan Hyland** scored a remarkable 201 goals in 202 games for **VEC** in 10 seasons. His **record 37 goals** in the 2016-2017 season surpassed **Joey's** 12-year old Club record of 36 goals in one season!
- **John Gleeson** scoring six goals in a cup game in the Phoenix Park in 1980, is a Club record.
- The **45** or so **players** who impressively **managed** the 3 teams in those 52 years – practically all of them while still playing. We greatly acknowledge their commitment and hard-work, as well as their enthusiasm, organisation, drive and tactical ability.
- **UCFL Representative Team**: All the **VEC** players who represented the League in the Oscar Traynor Tournament and other inter-league matches from **Dave Hughes** in 1974 to **Pat Quin, Mick Kenny, Ken Ryan, Denis Molony, Dave Spring and Gerry Hatch** in 1981; to **Noel Ryan & Eamon Gleeson** in 1989; (particularly when the UCFL team travelled to the Isle of Man); then **Paul Hughes, Tommy Doherty, John McCarthy, Chas Heather and Dermot Sharkey** followed by **Paul O'Sullivan** (2006) & **Darragh McGinley** (2008); **Joey Byrne, Peter Morrissey** and **Dara** and **Mark Doherty** around 2008 as well; and then by other VEC players called into the UCFL squad in 2011 – **Anthony Dunne & Neil Spring** and then **Aidan Hyland** was selected from 2015 onwards.



Then in 2016, **11 VEC players** achieving the honour of representing their League. While **Anthony Dunne, Joey Byrne, Mick Kinsella and Aidan Hyland** had previously represented the UCFL, it was a first for **Neal Breslin, Gav Murphy, Ray Jaudzems, Séamus Staunton, Pat Meghen, Killian Finlay and Richie Hannify.**

In 2018, **Paul Hutchinson and Dave Spring** remained at the helm of the UCFL league team for the 3rd season, and the **VEC** influence on the team remained potent with an astounding **10 VEC clubmen** among its ranks. **Gav Murphy** played in an amazing 7 of the 8 games in those 3 seasons; **Pat Meghen** in 6; **Aido Hyland** and **Neal Breslin** in 5.



In 2019, **Hutch** and **Dave** remained at the helm of the League team as more **VEC** players came aboard joining **Gavin Murphy, Mick Kinsella, Séamus Staunton and Ray Jaudzems: Davy Frewen, Peter O'Brien & Conall O'Shaughnessy.** When inter-league resumed in 2025 (after Covid-19), **Neill Love** and **Colin Power** were involved.

We congratulate all to them who represented the Club with distinction, particularly the 4 **VEC** players who were given the honour of captaining the league team at various times: **Pat Quin, Mick Kenny, Ken Ryan, and Gav Murphy.** What an honour!

- Sadly, we acknowledge the loss of six former players who died in recent years: striker **Pat Gleeson** from Thurles who played 41 games in the first four seasons; **John O'Leary** who was the goalkeeper in the 1980 Elvery Cup Final and also played for two seasons; the flamboyant **Willie Kissane** who was mentioned earlier and who played many memorable games in his total of 160 between 1982 and 1990, including the infamous 1983 Elvery (Challenge) Cup final; **Dave Fox (Snr.)** who played 370 games from 1982-1996; the carefree **Jimmy O'Loughlin**, who joined in 1977, played in 88 games in 5 years including two cup finals in 1980 & 1981 and died in December 2012. And the colourful and inspirational **Robbie Ebbs** who impressively managed VEC teams for five seasons in the 90's and who died in November 2022. Then in 2024, we learned that **Liam Cooke** – one of the founder members of **VEC Football Club** back in 1974 and the Club's Honorary Secretary for our first 10 seasons – doubling up as Honorary Treasurer for half that time – passed away on the same day in July as our 50th AGM. Very sad but poignant at the same time! May they rest in peace.

Closing Words from Dave Spring

who played in the first game for VEC in September 1974 – then played a record 750 for the Club – and was with us every one of those 52 years – and was on the side-line for our last game in June 2026.

- Football clubs have their own distinctive culture. From the day a Club was created to the present moment, each Club has a unique and individual ethos. They make us who we are and provide a sense of purpose for those in the Club. That ethos also inspires the way everyone in the Club expresses themselves on and off the pitch: and that, in **VEC Football Club**, has always been abundantly commendable. Everyone that ever played for **VEC FC** in our 52 years, or helped in the running of the Club, should all be very proud of their commitment to the Club's ethos and its code of conduct, which are the cornerstones of **VEC's** own distinctive culture.

You are all to be congratulated on your exploits, your endeavours and of course your successes on the field of play with **VEC FC** during those 52 years in which – between the 3 teams, **VEC** played circa 3,300 competitive games!

- As I said at our Golden Jubilee celebration, football teaches co-operation and teamwork, and that is an important means for people to form and maintain strong friendships that might otherwise not have existed: and many friendships evolved and continued among the **600+ players** who have ever donned the **VEC** jersey! Participation in any team sport allows you to make those lasting friendships, feel a sense of community, and learn to respect your teammates and coaches or managers. You all are (and have been) wonderful ambassadors for **VEC Football Club**, for our League and for our beautiful game. Let me share just a few lovely comments back from former players:

"I met amazing friends! great players, great people, great managers, great memories".

"I have made some lifelong friends who I still keep in touch with today".

"Football is all about the people you meet and the times you share together and VEC made that happen for lots of guys over the years".

"Probably my best memories from my 10 years living in, and calling Dublin my home".

"Personally, VEC gave me some of my best years in football".

And from the **CDETB**, who own & operate the Sportsgrounds in Terenure:

"The pitches at Terenure will feel noticeably quieter without VEC FC lighting them up. We sincerely hope that this is not a permanent goodbye, and we would welcome nothing more than seeing a VEC team take to the field in Terenure in the future".

And from Ray Brady in **Brady's** Terenure: *"It was always a pleasure to serve the lads from the VEC Club. Please pass on my very best wishes and thanks to everyone and I continue to look forward to welcoming you all over the years ahead".*

- It's been such a pleasure and an honour sharing this journey with every one of you. Obviously, too many people to mention, and too many memories to record them all. But I hope these are not 'final words' we will not completely rule out any future possibility of re-forming in some shape or form "never say never"! And as **Andy Myler** reminded us and I heartily endorse: **"Don't cry because it's over ... smile because it happened"**.
- I'll leave you with an extract from Richie Hannify's 2025-2026 Hon. Secretary's Report: **"Grounded in our rich history, we reach the final paragraph in the current chapter of VEC Football Club. Across 52 seasons, VEC FC has delivered more than its fair share of success on the pitch, forged lifelong bonds off the pitch, and is woven into the fabric of multiple generations of the same families. The club has spanned decades, weathered economic upheavals, and transcended global events! We have dined with Bond Girls, won quadruples, shared pitches with internationals, and logged countless miles to Limerick, Roscommon, Kilkenny, Kerry, Northern Ireland, and beyond. We have won, lost, cursed, and appealed together, but above all else, we have most certainly enjoyed our sporting lives together. So, wherever the VEC FC name goes next, those memories remain ours forevermore — as proud clubmen for life"**.
